Cheney council gets first look at budget

Flattened assessed property valuation and reduction in sales tax from construction projects should tighten general fund expenses in 2014

Cheney's City Council began its 2014 budget deliberations Tuesday night with a look at general fund revenues and expenses and the departments funded through property taxes and other fees.

The city's property tax assessed valuation is expected to reach \$510,239,897 next year, reflecting a relatively flat trend the past five years after a huge jump between 2009-2010 that increased valuations from the mid-\$400 million mark to just over \$500 million. The general property tax levy in 2014 is a

proposed \$1,206,497, reflecting a rate of \$2.37 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

The Emergency Medical Service levy, in its second year of six, is calculated at \$254,379, reflecting a rate of 50 cents per \$1,000. But while the EMS funds are dedicated, Finance Director Cindy Niemeier said not all of the taxes paid to the city stay in Cheney.

The school district receives 42 percent of the prop-

AH begins budget preparation

The annual budget season started up in Airway Heights at the Monday, Oct. 21 City Council meeting with a public hearing that outlined the budget presentation schedule over the next couple of months.

Airway Heights has a reported assessed valuation of \$460.6 million, aided by its annexation to the east. The population increased by over 25 percent in the annexation. Final numbers are expected toward the end of the year in order to aid with the budget's formation, which will roll out to the public in November and December.

The City Council heard a presentation from the Cheney School District regarding its clinic at Sunset Elementary, which has been successfully operating for the past year.

Joanna Heller, a representative from the Community Health Association of Spokane, said the clinic is open from 8 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Thursday and 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Friday. A licensed health social worker is on-site Tuesday

Cheney's crime rate still continuing under 2012 levels

Several Police Department measures are serving in maintaining an overall 20-plus percent reduction

While showing a slight up tick over the last months of

summer, crime in Cheney continues to be lower than this same time last year. And while the increase might be attrib-

able to more people back in the city as vacations end and schools start, Police Chief John Hensley points to measures the

department has undertaken in the last year and a half as reasons why overall levels are down — significantly.

"This is common sense policing," he said. "There's not a lot of science that goes into this. It's about thinking about what

you want to accomplish and using your resources to do it."

Several of those measures revolve around keeping police officers visible in the community. All patrol cars are now

New SCRAPS codes means slight changes in Medical Lake

In addition to hearing from Spokane County and its pursuit of approving Proposition 1 in the November election, at its Oct. 17 meeting the Medical Lake City Council heard from the Spokane County Regional Animal Protection Service (SCRAPS) on its plans for 2014.

Under the interlocal agreement, Medical Lake and other cities across Spokane County would be united in their animal control laws. For some jurisdictions, like Medical Lake, it would mean being charged just once for a three-year contract instead of facing a charge each time an animal control instance arises within

the city. Additionally, cities would give up their licensing renewal fees.

"From the city's perspective, it's totally worth it to do this," City Administrator Doug Ross said.

SCRAPS is moving into its new building (the former home to Harley Davidson) on Trent Avenue in April next year, making it more centrally

located than right now. The organization hopes to implement the interlocal agreements once moved into the facility, in order to create a cohesive set of regulations across the county. Currently, each jurisdiction can create their own set of animal control laws, which leads to different standards across the county.

Following the SCRAPS discussion, the City Council approved

its annual work contract

Shadix challenges Dolle for Cheney School Board Position 2

In the only contested West Plains school board race, Cheney School Board president Suzanne Dolle faces a challenge from political newcomer Kippie Shadix for the District 2 seat.

Dolle was elected to the seat in 2009. She studied elementary education at the University of Kentucky, has worked as a substitute teacher, elementary school paraprofessional along with several private sector positions. She has volunteered for various positions on PTA and PTO boards along with a community board for drug and alcohol awareness and Air Force support positions.

Shadix has a bachelor's of science degree in management/marketing, is an Air Force veteran and works for an Airway Heights company as a human resource/office coordinator. She has children in the Cheney School District and volunteers with Future Business Leaders of America, Second Harvest and a program advisory committee for a local university.

Why did you decide to run for office?

Shadix likes to get involved and was trying to encourage others to run, but decided she should "put my money where my mouth is and do something." She admits she has much to learn about the position, but loves researching and is good at asking questions.

"I think the community needs to be more educated, better informed on what's going on in the schools and given better opportunities to participate," Shadix said.

Dolle has always had a passion for children as an educator and parent. She began serving on school boards and committees as a way to keep up on issues and decisions impacting her children's lives.

"I love what I do, even though it can be frustrating and time consuming," she said. "When you see you've affected just one person's life, it makes it all worthwhile."

If elected, what would you like to see accomplished in four years?

Dolle said high school overcrowding and modernization issues are the biggest need right now. The district must address these while keeping existing programs growing and do it with the "least amount of impact on the taxpayers."

She stressed regular contact with elected officials to let them know how their decisions

impact local education and families. She said the board must look at the district's dynamics, where kids are coming from, their living conditions and incorporate more into budgeting.

Shadix said a bond to improve the high school worries her. She would like to see more research, particularly on other options and ways of shaving costs.

"Eighty million dollars is a lot of money," she said.

She would examine bus routes for ways of doing things differently to save maintenance, fuel costs and time spent riding. She'd like to look at partnering with organizations to create a skill center in the district that would provide vocational learning opportunities.

What are some of the biggest challenges facing the school district?

Shadix lists the implementation of Common Core standards, and while she admits she doesn't know enough yet,

believes it could increase costs to install. She points to continued uncertainty over the economy as another challenge.

Dolle's challenge is "Getting space for the kiddos." Another is restoring funding cut during previous state budget cycles, and staying on top of legislators to make sure they keep making progress. The district also needs to look at alternative sources, like more grants, to find ways to keep programs going.

What's your opinion on how well the state has conformed to the McCleary decision?

Dolle said the Supreme Court decision ordering the Legislature to adhere to its constitutional requirement providing ample provisions for basic education has restored some funding cuts. She realizes there are pros and cons on both sides of the funding argument, but said the long-term effects of reduced educational opportunities cost more than providing ample funding for education up front.

"If we don't stick up for our kids, provide for our children, we're going to see more of the vulnerable population growing," she said.

Shadix said she has more to learn on this as well, but feels it's important to make sure the increased state funding goes to students and not the system. She would like to see how the state fully funding vs. local levy funding affects property owners, businesses and consumers, but said the decision brings more questions than answers.

"I hope this is an opportunity for a closer review of the finances and the educational processes which could lead to true reform because just pouring more money into the system is not a wise decision," she wrote in an email.

What are your feelings about a new school in Airway Heights or north of I-90?

This is almost Shadix' signature issue as she has addressed the school board on several occasions about building a new facility, possibly a

new high school, north of Interstate 90. The only district building north of I-90 is Sunset Elementary, constructed in 1952, and Shadix sees a new school closer to, if not in, Airway Heights as a means of reducing transportation costs while supporting growing community spirit.

Dolle is not opposed to a new facility north of I-90, but the district needs to build "where the students are" while being efficient with funding and programs. There are many costs people don't see when discussing a new school, Dolle said, such as wetlands and soil remediation and staffing, noting the three schools built with the 2010 bond money significantly increased the district's operating costs.

Why vote for you?

Dolle cited her board experience service in other districts around the country, bringing a variety of perspectives.

"I love what I do," she said. "I love working for students in the district."

Shadix said she has the business perspective of being a "wise consumer," and noted she is adding an education component through classes at Eastern Washington University.

"I work well with people and I've always been a good team player," she said.

Estrellado seeks spot on board

Marcie Estrellado, a 10-year Cheney School Board member and incumbent for District Position 1 may be running unopposed, but her determination and admiration for her school board duties are at an all time high.

"I really love being a part of the school system," Estrellado said. "Being on the school board not only enables me to see a bigger picture of the entire school district, but it also enables me to see each individual child's story and how important it is and what our staff is doing to make sure that those child's needs are met."

Estrellado has a few things she would like to see accomplished throughout her next term on the school board including successfully passing a bond for improvements on the high school and also working with the state to move toward fairly compensating the school district staff.

While she works towards a resolution for these issues, one thing that Estrellado sees as a challenge moving forward is a perceived lack of trust from the public in the school board's decision-making process.

"I think it's a real challenge," Estrellado said. "I see what happens in our

meetings and in our planning and when I read and hear feedback, I worry that people don't trust that we are in the decision making process every step of the way and have all of the players and all of the information possible to make the best decision possible."

One issue that Estrellado has been a prominent player in for the past 10 years is the talks of building a new school in the Airway Heights area, something she doesn't view as financially feasible.

"It's always been a consideration, it's always

Browne wants to return to CSD board

Residents of the Cheney area might be asking what can Browne do for you?

Taking over the Cheney School Board District 3 position in January after previous incumbent Kerry O'Connor resigned, Henry Browne is looking to pick up right where he left off.

"I think that there are a lot of good things going on right now and I would like to see us continue the good work we are already doing," Browne said.

Among the things Browne would like to

accomplish as a school board in the next four years is becoming more fiscally responsible while also working to get more involvement from the local communities outside of the Cheney area.

"The school district represents a pretty big geographical area," Browne said. "And one of the concerns that has been made known is the lack of geographical balance as far as the distribution of the schools within the district."

To tackle the issue of geographical balance, Browne supports the idea of beginning to look at the options regarding building a new school in

Airway Heights or north of I-90.

"I think it is something that we definitely need to look at and start planning now so when the time comes where we have to construct another school, that should definitely not only be an option, but more of a priority I think."

While that issue may be down the road, one challenge that Browne currently sees facing the school district is a lack of resources to accomplish the tasks that they are given.

"A lot of the mandates are regulatory changes

Curriculum, budget are focus in ML

Since 1989, Peggy Schweikhardt has served on the Medical Lake School District board of directors, and is running unopposed for another four-year term on the board in the Nov. 5 election.

At the time, she worked in the Spokane School District, but was actively looking for a way to spend more time helping families in Medical Lake.

"I wanted to give back to the community," she said.

Some of the challenges she sees in the upcoming years are what the district has been working through for quite some time now. Chief among those is the budget, which continues to be a difficult subject for public school districts in the state.

"We want to be sure all kids are growing and

state and federal funding stabilized, however she noted that the federal side of that pursuit would be the most difficult. Sequestration budget cuts affected the district's ability to receive impact aid, money that makes up for military installations that don't pay property tax.

With the many changes taking place over the last few years, she hopes that funding comes through so the district can ensure material taught in class is current. Purchasing new textbooks in conjunction with adopting a new curriculum is pricey for any school district.

"I want to make sure the curriculum lives up to our goals," she said.

Also adding to the pile is a new teacher-principal evaluation system that the district has been piloting for the past year. The state will roll out the program in the near

future, changing the way teachers are evaluated by principals.

Schweikhardt said the district has managed its finances well during the economic recession, despite numerous difficulties along the way. She said the district's AP classes, resources for kids, STEM classes and after school sessions are particularly strong.

"We've done a really good job moving into the STEM arena," she said.

Also new this year is all-day kindergarten, which she said has been a blessing for some parents, and a big help for educating students.

In addition, Schweikhardt said all of the buildings have been remodeled and are up to date for decades to come.

been on the platform, it's just that there's more to it than 'OK I think I'll pick here' and buy land and build and so forth," Estrellado said. "I had this conversation with Mike Dunn at that time when he was our superintendent and I felt like that was a leaf we turned over. It wasn't something we didn't consider, it just

wasn't a direction that was financially feasible."

And while the budget of the school district was supposed to get a boost from the 2012 McCleary decision in which the Supreme Court ruled that the State of Washington was failing to live up to their constitutional duty to fund K-12 students and ordered the Legislature to make measurable progress to fully fund

K-12 education by 2018, Estrellado feels as if the state is still falling "drastically" short.

All in all Estrellado feels that her passion for her school board duties and doing what is right for the children will propel her into a successful four years.

"I really have a passion for what we do on the school board," Estrellado said. "Impacting children

is such a huge thing to me. When we are having our meetings and when we are on the school board, together we have to remind each other that it is not always about dollars and its not always about the adults and accommodating sizes, all of those things are important, but how does it impact the kids? And that's what we fight for is what is best for kids."

and a lot of them involve additional resources," Browne said. "Unfortunately a lot of those mandates are unfunded and so we are in this constant battle of trying to play catch up. Robbing Peter to pay Paul, so to speak."

This lack of adequate funding, Browne said, was addressed in January 2012 when the Wash-

ington State Supreme Court ruled that the state was failing to live up to its 'paramount duty' of providing ample funding toward the education of all K-12 students and ordered the Legislature to "make steady, real and measurable progress each year and to fully fund K-12 public education by 2018."

And while Browne sees this McCleary deci-

sion as a step in the right direction, it hasn't necessarily been a solution to this point.

"We haven't seen anything delivered yet," Browne said. "Again, even if they paid everything that they've had in the budget it still wouldn't bring us whole. But it would be a step in the right direction. I think they're moving in the right direction, but we are not there yet."

While resources may not be where Browne would like them to be, he

believes that his passion for education and his love of learning makes him the perfect candidate for the position.

"I believe in lifelong learning," Browne said. "And I think as a parent with children in the school district currently, I have a vested interest in making our school district the best in the state and doing the best we can to ensure our children get a fair chance of succeeding in their lives by the foundation we can give them in our schools."

Keep kicking the debt can until the next time

In Our Opinion

Last Wednesday, Congress did what they appear to be experts at – and that’s very little.

Sure, they did do their best at dueling demagoguery. It’s seemingly what they spend the most time at earning their \$175,000 a year. Oh, they did get their regular workout kicking the very dented and nearly crushed debt can down the pothole-pocked road.

A 285-144 vote in the House of Representatives, which followed 81-18 approval in the Senate, allowed about 18-percent of the federal government to reopen and the government to keep spending uncontrollably as they do so well.

President Obama followed Congressional approval when he signed yet another continuing resolution funding the government through Jan. 15 and raising the nation’s debt ceiling until Feb. 7.

The total debt stood at \$17,085,395,024,387.53 as of

this past Monday morning, surpassing the historical barrier sometime last Friday. When one spends at the rate of over \$300 million a day there was no finish-line camera to catch the exact moment.

Once again we’ve been taken to the so-called edge of yet another fiscal cliff. Our leaders are so adept in fixing the blame, but far away from repairing the problem.

Pulled back from the brink, a place it seems we face regularly, one has to wonder what might really happen if no one blinked in this game of congressional chicken? While the amateur accountants and auditors on the floors of Congress warned of absolute Armageddon, others more schooled in finance thought otherwise.

Vernon L. Smith, suggested that the president’s claim that, “every economist out there is saying” that “millions of Americans – not just federal workers – everybody, faces real economic hardship” if the

debt ceiling isn’t raised, simply is not true

And while Smith might have a common name, the 2002 co-winner of the Nobel Prize in Economics maybe ought to have a pretty solid understanding of how things work. We’re not sure of the extent of the president’s personal business acumen.

History is on the side of the U.S., Smith explained. The U.S. is one of the few countries in the world and in history that has never defaulted on its debt.

Remember, this is a government that takes in \$2.5 trillion a year and was not really running out of money in the piggy bank. Its \$3.6 trillion yearly spending addiction was the real issue.

And that has another camp pushing for a default because the current debt – while it has spiraled upward out of control during the last two administrations – goes back in history to post-Revolutionary War times when the federal government assumed the states’ costs of that conflict.

If we “repudiate” – or refuse to accept or support – on the debt, in the real world we declare a form of bankruptcy. Our credit cards are chopped up and we must live off of what we earn and that’s what some hardline conservatives think is the proper path.

It’s somewhat of a logical argument until one considers to whom that debt has been incurred.

China owns a little over 20 percent of the \$5.6758 trillion held by foreign countries. The rest of the more than \$17 trillion debt is owed by either the American people, or by the U.S. government to itself. About 45 percent is money borrowed from we the people and places like the Social Security Trust Fund, for example.

With the latest “sky is falling” episode behind us, now the country awaits the next crisis, be it foreign or domestic. Until that happens, 316 million citizens in this country can bide the time watching their \$54,000 share of this debt continue to grow.

Labeling foods is needed, I-522 fulfills that need

Labeling genetically engineered foods tells us more than just what has been done to the food; it tells us what has been done to our land and our water. Farmers who grow crops from genetically engineered seeds are required to sign a contract agreeing to use farm chemicals produced by the same companies that sell the genetically engineered seeds. Weeds are becoming resistant to those chemicals, requiring heavier applications of the chemicals. These chemicals are taking a toll on our soil and contaminating our water supply. I support YES on I-522, the labeling initiative, so that I can know what foods are produced by methods that are detrimental to the environment, so I can choose to avoid them.

News Flash! Last week, Washington State Attorney General Bob Ferguson filed a complaint charging that the Grocery Manufacturers Association (GMA) violated the state’s Public Disclosure Act, a citizen sponsored measure enacted 40 years ago to let the public know who gives, and how much, to campaigns. The GMA had set up a special fund through which companies could donate money to oppose I-522, without their identities being known. Thanks to Ferguson’s charge, on Friday those companies were made public.

You may have noticed on the literature opposing labeling, that the GMA is the top contributor to the NO campaign, followed by Monsanto, DuPont Pioneer, Dow AgroSci-

ences, and Bayer CropScience. Within the GMA, we now know that Pepsico, Coca-Cola, and Nestle have each contributed over a million dollars to stifle our right to know, followed by many other companies you’ll recognize -- Hershey, General Mills, Kellogg, Orowheat, Sara-Lee, Land O’Lakes, Del Monte, Campbell Soup, Hormel, and Ocean Spray for starters.

And the GMA hasn’t begun to spend all the money that’s been contributed. So you can expect to see a lot more being spent between now and Nov. 5 in an effort to prevent labeling of genetically engineered food in Washington, because they know that if it passes in Washington, there’s no stopping it.

Please join me in voting YES on I-522, to label genetically engineered food.

I can hardly wait to see what's next with the ACA

It's hardly original thinking to offer the notion that the Obama Administration really welcomed the partial government shutdown.

That's despite all their rhetoric in wanting to get the latest continuing resolution signed, sealed and delivered to end the partial

government shutdown and allow continued borrowing to feed their ravenous appetite for revenue.

The shuttering of about 20 percent of the federal government, and the crisis it was painted to be by the media - and various members of Congress - served as the perfect diversion and smokescreen to cover the disastrous rollout of The Affordable Care Act, or Obamacare as it is so widely called.

It's amazing to think that after all the time this law has been on the books,

and in the works - some say its architecture is really decades and decades old - and how tech-savvy this administration has been, that an e-commerce site would be such an utter failure.

Makes me cringe to think about the real end product. But having heard a fellow AARP'er wonder already about why she could not find a doctor that is covered under Medicare while visiting Atlanta provided a clue.

As part of the projected \$678 million cost associated with the rollout of the new

healthcare law, the contract for an admittedly sophisticated website - HealthCare.gov - was issued to of all companies, the U.S. subsidiary of a Canadian company, CGI.

It's not bad enough that \$93.7 million of your and my money appears to have been lit on fire, but not before some portion of it left the country, too. But the track record of CGI is hardly anything to write home about.

Their contract with the Canadian government's Canadian Firearms Infor-

mation System was cancelled in 2007 after being "significantly over budget" and the project riddled with delays. It cost the Canadian government an estimated \$91 million in hard costs.

CGI's past seems to have as many holes in it as there are excuses on why no one in Health and Human Services, from Secretary Kathleen Sebelius on down, can provide any kind of hard numbers on ACA enrollment.

And numbers, especially those from the low-risk young enrollees who will pay the bills for those of us on the other end of the pool, are critical to the success, or failure, of the ACA.

To fix the site will entail fixing some 5 million lines of computer code. My eyes cross when I look behind the curtain at what the HTML code looks like that makes an ultra-simple website work.

In the real world, if a

company got fleeced as bad as the federal government has with CGI, there would be some kind of remedy in the way of service after the sale, but apparently not this time.

USA Today is reporting "Verizon's Enterprise Solutions division has been asked by the Department of Health and Human Services to improve the performance of the HealthCare.gov site."

My guess is that my cell service provider is certainly not doing this out of their "patriotic duty," and that somewhere soon we'll find out how many additional millions we will be paying to fix this mess. Or I'll see another bump in my bill.

With a rollout like this I can hardly wait to see what's coming next. But the way things have worked so far over the past five years, I'm sure there will be a new diversion to try to take our minds off whatever it is.

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Beekeeping classes hope to change bee's bad rap

Bees are pretty remarkable creatures that get a bad rap and the West Plains Beekeeping Association is out to try to change their reputation and perception.

In a series of classes that begin Saturday, Nov. 2 and continue the following two Saturdays, the curious public is invited to be part of a beginning beekeeping course that take place at the Pizza Factory in Medical Lake from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Cost is \$30 plus \$10 for Washington State Beekeeping Association Test Booklet. To register, call 509-863-5666 or for more information visit www.wpbeekeepers.org.

"We're mostly for the hobbyist beekeeper, people interested in keeping bees because they're interested in them," West Plains Beekeepers spokesperson Margo Buckles said. "They're fascinating insects."

The classes are the

first step for someone interested purely out of curiosity, or in pursuing the avocation as Buckles has since joining the group three years ago. There are no commercial beekeepers in the group.

There are three levels of beekeeping in the state starting with apprentice,

where the West Plains classes will initially take you. The next level is that of journeyman and finally master.

Like the plumbing and electrical trades, to become a master the first step is be an apprentice. Next comes being a journeyman, which requires two years of bee-

keeping experience and a record of having observed a hive for a year.

Finally there's master. "There are very few masters in the state of Washington," Buckles said. But the WPBA has one in one of the group's founders, Jim Miller.

"Mostly when people

think bees they think I'm gonna' get stung," Buckles said. The reality is, she said, "If you keep bees you are going to get stung." In two years in the practice, Buckles said she's maybe been stung six times. "Mostly my fault," she admitted.

For all their bad rap, "They are incredible honey producers," Buckles said. Bees will not come out of the hive to sting you unless you've done something to disturb them, Buckles said.

Honey bees are not native to the United States, but are a crucial element in segments of agriculture. They arrived in North America in the mid-1600s, Buckles said.

In California, for example, Buckles said the almond crop is exclusively bee-pollinated. In the Central Valley of Washington it would be the cherry crop.

Buckles' interest is one that was rekindled a few years ago after she took classes on the East Coast. Recent visits to

the Spokane County Fair and its beehive displays cemented the interest.

Two years ago Buckles and husband, Kevin Oldenburg, took a class about the activity through the Inland Empire Beekeeping Association.

Another series of classes will take place in the spring with a different focus, including putting bees in the hive. "It's one thing to sit in the class and learn about the stuff, it's another thing to see it in action," Buckles said.

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Cheney site of regional transportation public meeting

The Spokane Regional Transportation Council (SRTC) is taking public opinion on the future of transportation investments in the Spokane-area. The SRTC has completed a draft of the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Horizon 2040, and

is making it available to the public with two open houses and a 30-day public comment period.

The public will get a chance to see their comments reflected at two open houses. The first is Tuesday, Oct. 29 from 4-6 p.m. at the Cheney

Library, 610 First St. The second is Wednesday, Nov. 6 from 5:30-7:30 p.m. at the Northeast Community Center, 4001 N. Cook St. in Spokane.

Horizon 2040 is a long-term "blueprint" that guides how the regional transportation system will

grow and develop through the year 2040. It is based on projections for growth in population, housing and jobs and takes into consideration every mode of transportation, such as private vehicles, public transit, bicycling, walking, freight movement, rail and air travel.

Horizon 2040 includes projected demands expected on the regional transportation system between 2014 and 2040, condition of existing transportation facilities, strategies to operate and maintain regional transportation facilities and manage congestion, assessments of area pedestrian and bicycle facilities, a list of transportation projects and programs to be constructed or completed by 2040 and a financial plan to carry out all of the above activities.

Horizon 2040 is required to demonstrate that funding exists, or will exist, to pay for each of the projects recommended by the plan to be built or completed.

mitted by emailing contact.srtc@srtc.org, mailing to SRTC or by calling (509) 343-6370. The public comment period for Horizon 2040 runs from Oct. 18-Nov. 16.

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Project would provide affordable housing in Airway Heights

A public hearing at the Airway Heights Planning Commission's meeting last week offered in-depth details into a proposed multifamily housing project on South Craig Road near Highway 2.

After missing the last two meetings due to a lack of a quorum, the commission heard the plans from Defender Development's Steve Emtman, who wants to provide an affordable housing option for people living in the Accident Potential Zone leading to Fairchild Air Force Base's runway. The property is currently zoned as R-2, and could handle seven to 10 units per acre.

Other surrounding nearby land is zoned for mobile home housing. Emtman asked the commission to change the zoning to R-3 for multifamily housing, which allows a minimum of 10 units per acre and a maximum of 20 per acre.

The issue would normally be a simple zoning change, however part of Emtman's property resides in the 70-decibel Joint Land Use Study sound contour, requiring approval from the JLUS Steering Committee.

Development Services Director Derrick Braaten said the only written comments received on the project were from the city's Public Works Department. He also said that previous commissioners' input included concerns of having a large amount of low-income housing in one particular area.

"There's a concern that we'd have a re-creation of the south side next to the new \$600,000 park," he said. "But that assumes a negative character of people. Just because someone moves into a studio apartment doesn't mean they're a bad person."

Emtman acquired the undeveloped property from State Bank two years ago. To date, one cottage home has been built on the lot, with the finished buildout having a neighborhood feel, he said.

"I don't build low quality stuff," Emtman said. "I like to take pride in what I do."

Addressing some of the concerns, he said properties nearer to the Aspen Grove Park will be a bit on the higher end, noting the versatility of the location.

"When you move into a new place like that, you do take pride in it," Commissioner Lorna Jones said.

Ultimately, the commission approved the suggestion of 15 units per acre, which was forwarded to the City Council for two ordinance readings.

The commission also passed two action items, the first of which changes the time of Planning Commission meetings. Due to the City Council's decision to add a second work study session each month, the Planning Commission meetings will change to the second Wednesday of each month.

"We'll still have one meeting per month," Braaten said.

During his staff report, Braaten said water and sewer lines were being placed along north of Deer Heights Road, where the future road extension will go. Construction in the area is ongoing.

He also said the city is looking to eventually place a light at the intersection to help alleviate some traffic issues in the area. The city of Spokane is already pursuing a traffic light at the Highway 2 and Flint Road intersection to aid congestion and safety, given the growing number of vehicles on Highway 2 each day.

marked, creating a more noticeable presence.

Also, officers do all their reports from the field on their laptops since the latest technology allows them to essentially be their own self-contained police station. Pulling over somewhere to write reports keeps them in the field longer while also increasing their visibility.

"The only time they need to come in is to book somebody," Hensley said.

Scheduling plays into this. Contrary to what some might think, Hensley said 65 percent of the radio calls the department receives occur during the day instead of at night.

That has led to two officers being assigned daytime patrols instead of one, with reserve officers filling in as needed. The department still has three officers on duty at night, with reserves again filling in, but the shift has helped provided better call back up and response times during the day.

Scheduling has also played a role in the department's Community Policing and Problem Solving Philosophy, COPPS. Originally started as sector policing under former chief Jeff Sale, the program faced problems with effectiveness because some sectors were assigned to officers on night shifts, but whose constituents were best contacted during the day.

The department now lines up sector responsi-

bility with officers shifts so an officer working days has responsibility to work with business owners downtown, and can meet with them during their hours. It's also helped increase the department's focus on customer service, Hensley said, by allowing officers to stay on scene until the problem is fixed or a plan put in place.

"When a citizen calls about a problem, they don't want an email," Hensley said. "They want to see a badge."

The department also relies more on its Volunteers in Policing (VIPs) program to take care of daily tasks that used to require officers to come in from the field such as paperwork, taking care of the property and evidence room and doing inventory work. But Hensley said the 8-10 VIPs also get out in the field, doing vacation checks, alerting citizens about potential theft

opportunities such as open garage doors and running unoccupied vehicles as well as assisting with traffic control at major events.

Other steps the department has taken have been closer, weekly coordination with Eastern Washington University's Police Department and the renewal of the school resource officer position with the Cheney School District.

The measures seem to have made a difference. Halfway through the year, department statistics showed uniform crime report (UCR) offenses down in all 11 categories, reflecting an overall decrease of 28.85 percent. Notable among these was an almost 66 percent drop in criminal alcohol offenses, 38.64 percent decrease in assaults, 30.6 percent drop in burglaries, 27.7 percent decline in thefts and a 21.25 percent decline in domestic violence.

Statistics in July and August showed an upward trend in most areas, although thefts dropped further to 29.67 percent in July but have since crept up and held consistent at a 24 decrease in August and September. Overall crime rose slightly to a 26 percent reduction in year-to-date figures in July as compared to 2012, and 22.22 percent similarly in August.

Those figures have remained down so that overall crime in the first nine months of 2013 is 23.42 percent lower than the same time in 2012.

Hensley said they have also been more aggressive in following up with offender registrations, with detectives making house checks to keep track of paroles, probationers and sex offenders. Warrant service is being performed with more diligence, a special enforcement detail is in the works and the department has pursued close relationships with outside agencies such as the U.S. Marshal Service, Target Zero traffic enforcement and the Spokane Violent Gang Enforcement Team, a relationship that saw Cheney officers helping the team net three alleged gang members on federal warrants Oct. 10.

One of the biggest changes Hensley said is in department morale, which was helped by a restructuring of the organizational chart — which unanimous support from the local union — that

removed one administrative layer. Hensley said all these measures serve to give officers more of a sense of ownership in the community.

"Everybody out there is the chief of police of Cheney," Hensley said. "Everybody has the abil-

ity to deal with the problems they are assigned to or come across. My role is to provide for their needs. In turn, they take pride in their community."

erty tax pie, with the state next at 20 percent, Cheney at 19 percent, county services totaling 15 percent and EMS at 4 percent. At \$12.22 per \$1,000 of assessed value in 2013, that works out to \$5.05 for schools, \$2.45 for the state, \$2.37 for the city, with the rest divided between EMS, the county and library services.

"The state gets a higher percentage of taxes than the city," Mayor Tom Trulove said.

Cheney's proposed property tax assessment for 2014 increases just 2 cents, which combined with the EMS levy means an annual charge of \$430.50 for a \$150,000 home.

When it comes to general fund revenue sources, property taxes account for 58 percent of what the city takes in, followed by intergovernmental sources - fees, licenses, etc. - at 24 percent and charges for goods and services at 12 percent. The major sources of tax revenues will come from property, utility and sales and use, with city officials anticipating a drop off in sales tax due to several major construction projects at Eastern Washington University wrapping up and nothing coming down the pipeline.

"Last year was a record breaking year for our

sales tax," Niemeier said of 2012. "We're not going to achieve that this year. We will slightly reach our budget of \$1.2 million collected.

Cheney's utility tax revenue has maintained a relatively smooth pattern of increases since 2004, something Niemeier said is good considering how much the city has grown in that timeframe. One area the city has seen a big revenue impact is liquor excise sales taxes, which have fallen drastically since a voter initiative privatized liquor sales in 2012.

Niemeier said the city received some profits from the sales of state liquor stores, but as of right now hasn't seen much in the way of revenues it is supposed to receive from the state in both excise and sales profit monies.

"The excise tax is still a little bit up in the air," she added.

Department heads from the six departments funded through the general fund presented budget information at Tuesday's meeting, although due to a glitch in the city's computer system not all information was available at press time.

In other action, the council approved two Police Department resolutions. The first was accepting a \$2,196 grant from Bureau of Justice Assistance for

replacement of bulletproof vests. Police Chief John Hensley said vests are replaced on a rotational policy, with 3-4 being replaced this year.

The council also approved a four-year lease of a police vehicle for the Cheney School District student resource officer. The city and school district agreed the district would provide the vehicle as part of its contract, but are prohibited from owning a police vehicle.

Instead they have agreed to reimburse the city for the \$44,029 cost of the agreement with First Capital Equipment Leasing Corp.

Finally, the council heard an information only presentation from Spokane County Commissioner Al French on Proposition 1, a ballot measure to increase the regular property tax levy 6.5 cents per \$1,000 in order to raise \$18.1 million over nine years to purchase property that commissioner and county business groups see as threatening Fairchild Air Force Base. The money would be used to purchase 188 mobile homes located in Accident Potential Zone 2, inside the city limits of Airway Heights, and move those to remove the encroachment threat to the base.

and Thursday to help with illnesses.

Over 70 percent of the students seen at the clinic were on Medicaid, with most cases largely consisting of coughs and sneezes. That time, however, that students are treated on-site saves both parents and educators in the long run.

Of note during the presentation included statistics on disciplinary notices. Last year, the school issued around 1.5 notices per day, according to the administration, and now that's down to one notice per four days.

The clinic is looking for additional funding by applying for grants and speaking to area entities. Patient revenues at the facility only recoup 10 percent of the operating cost of the clinic. In order to fill that void, a dental center is in the works to handle some minor teeth issues.

To pay for the dental clinic, CHAS asked the City Council to consider contributing \$10,000 for capital funding. The total cost of installing the dental clinic is \$45,000, and an additional 100 square feet would be needed. If the office is

up and running, CHAS said it would cover the school clinic's operating costs by 60 percent, leaving the remainder for grants.

The second annual Trunk or Treat event returns to the Sunset Elementary parking lot on Halloween night, beginning at 6 p.m. There, youngsters can go around to different community members' cars and satisfy their sweet tooth on the numerous candy offerings.

Another public hearing detailed the Community Development Block Grant project on 15th Avenue from Campbell to Lawson streets. A 6-

inch steel line is being taken out and increased, which will enhance firefighters' capabilities in the city.

Also approved at the meeting was a memorandum of understanding between the city's Fire Department, Spokane County Fire District 10 and the Medical Lake Fire Department for training. Councilwoman Tonya Dashiell emphasized how important she believed the item was, after receiving a briefing from all three agencies earlier this year.

Included in the ordinances passed at the

meeting was the first reading to change the planning commission's monthly meeting date to the second Wednesday of each month.

"The planning commission all agreed that Wednesday worked fine for them," Development Services Director Derrick Braaten said.

Two separate resolutions unanimously accepted by the City Council declared October as Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Month as well as Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

with the Department of Corrections, which uses offenders from Airway Heights Corrections Center throughout the city.

Ross also mentioned the city would need to look at its Waste-to-Energy agreement in the next year, as it expires in November 2014. Spokane County, which is taking over the plant's operation after the decades-long operating agreement set up in the 1980s comes to a close. Cities can pursue their own waste management options, but must at least notify the county of their intent one year in advance.

"This gives you the opportunity to see if there is a more affordable way to haul your waste," he said.

When the contract

ends, cities who had indicated their desire to pursue other options can still sign a new service agreement with the county.

Also approved at the City Council meeting was a request from the Medical Lake School District to have a bonfire during its homecoming rally on the lower baseball fields Wednesday, Oct. 16 from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. The item required council approval as it goes against the city's burning ban. According to the district's request letter, last year's bonfire was canceled due to growing fire danger.

One item tabled at the meeting was the first reading of Ordinance 1030, which would prohibit the feeding of deer within city limits.

Coming up at the Tuesday, Nov. 5 City

Council meeting is a public hearing for the 2014 budget and a possible increase in EMS levy taxes and regular property taxes.

Mayor John Higgins said a survey would be going out in the city's seasonal newsletter, inquiring opinions regarding curbside recycling in Medical Lake. The issue has come up sporadically throughout the year, particularly following a change from using Waste Management to Sunshine

Disposal at the city's recycling center.

Eastern tops both preseason polls for first time in Wendy Schuller era

After winning a program-record 14 league games and advancing to the WNIT for the second time in school history a year ago, Big Sky coaches and media members have tabbed the Eastern Washington women's basketball team first in the Big Sky preseason polls, announced by the conference office Wednesday, Oct. 16.

EWU's previous best preseason ranking under head coach Wendy Schuller came prior to the 2010-11

season when the Eagles were picked to finish second in both polls.

Eastern received six first-place votes out of a possible nine in the coaches poll and 20 first-place votes out of a possible 30 in the media poll.

"It's nice that people think highly of us," Schuller said. "I approach it with the same mindset I've always had, being that it doesn't matter where you start, it matters where you finish."

Schuller hopes the selection serves as a motivational piece for her team. "We have high expectations this season," she said. "This team is very intrinsically motivated and isn't content to rest on their laurels."

The Eagles return four starters and nine letter winners from last year's squad that came in third in the Big Sky with a 14-6 mark in conference games.

The long list of talented returners are junior guard Lexie Nelson, who earned First Team All-Big Sky honors last season, and sophomore forward Hayley Hodgins, Eastern's first recipient of the Big Sky Freshman of the Year Award in 20 years.

EWU won nine of its first 12 league games a year ago before ending the year on a three-game winning streak heading into the conference tournament. Eastern defeated Montana State in the first round before falling in overtime to Northern Colorado in the semifinals. Seeded against PAC-12 member Washington in the first round of the WNIT, the Eagles lost a heartbreaker in double overtime, 65-60, in Seattle.

Blackhawks execution leads to 28-14 win over Deer Park

Adjustments at half help Cheney to first league win

Just about any coach will tell you the secret to winning on the field is execution - plain and simple doing what you're supposed to do.

In the first half of last Friday's Homecoming game with visiting Deer Park the Cheney football team was their own worst enemy at times, with mistakes pre-

In the second half, execution took over. The Blackhawks scored three straight touchdowns, one defensively, en route to a 28-14 Great Northern League win.

Cheney drove efficiently deep into Deer Park territory on the opening drive of

the second half, but came up short of points on a missed field goal. On the next play the Stags tried a screen pass that was dropped.

The Deer Park players, thinking it was an incomplete pass, stopped playing, but because the ball was thrown behind the line of scrimmage, the play was still live. Safety Ty Graham scooped up the ball at the seven and ran it in for the game-tying score.

Cheney took the lead on a drive that started at their 28 and ended with an Andrew Graham to Logan

Clayden 28-yard touchdown pass, putting Cheney up 13-7. The Blackhawks took a two-score lead when Graham found Shane Hammel on a deep route down the middle for a 44-yard score.

Stags quarterback Nic Clough connected with tight end Travis Pierce on a seven-yard TD cutting Cheney's lead to 21-14. Blackhawks' junior tailback Austin Kline then capped his solid rushing game with a 41-yard TD run that

On "The X-Files," FBI agent Fox Mulder said "I want to believe" regarding the existence of extra-terrestrial life. Mariners fans across the Northwest, including myself, have adopted the saying for the team, wanting to believe that one day the team will manage to have a stretch of success.

The organization is arguably in deeper despair than it was at its last major crisis, around 2008 when it had a failing management, offensive woes and were equivalent to an old dishrag sitting on the sink gathering a rather pungent smell. This year, they finished 71-91, four games worse than last season.

Well, the more things change, the more they stay the same.

Sure, Safeco Field received a facelift in the past offseason. It now boasts smaller dimensions, a purportedly great eating establishment in Edgar's and a high definition screen so everyone can watch Felix Hernandez up close. But those physical improvements don't add to the players taking to the field.

Just like in 2008 people are clamoring for a change in upper management, hoping to hit a restart button on the team's perennial struggles since the start of the millennium. Why the need for new leadership at the top?

The Mariners remain one of the teams in Major League Baseball who have never tasted a World Series game. After over 35 years in operation, the team has only advanced to the postseason a handful of times, the last being 2001 when they won 116 regular season games. Since then, while the M's have achieved just four winning seasons, they have achieved the status of "most unimportant team in the league" for 2014.

Let's be honest, outside of Hernandez and a handful of fairly talented

Eagles get rolling in second half of SUU win

Get ready to battle Griz Saturday in Missoula

For a half and then some, last Saturday's Homecoming football game between Eastern Washington and Southern Utah had a certain sense of déjà vu to it.

It seemed eerily familiar to the 2012 contest between the two teams played in Cedar City where missed opportunities eventually cost the

Eagles both the game, 30-27, and their No. 1 ranking in the Football Championship Subdivision.

In the 2012 game, then

redshirt freshman quarterback Vernon Adams struggled in his start and was relieved later by Kyle Padron. But this time Adams found his way, lighting a spark out of potential dud play near the midpoint of the third quarter as Eastern scored a 34-10 victory before a sellout crowd of 10,135 at Roos Field.

Eastern improved to 3-0 in Big Sky Conference play and 5-2 overall with the win as they head to Missoula Saturday for a 12:30 p.m. kickoff against Montana.

With Eastern leading 14-0 following a 21-yard interception return for

a touchdown from true freshman Samson Ebukam with 8 minutes, 2 seconds remaining in the first quarter, and Ashton Clark's 12-yard TD catch six minutes later, the appearance of a blowout surfaced.

However, a pair of Adams turnovers in the first quarter - an interception and a fumble on consecutive possessions - stopped their quick start. It took a while to get their swagger back but Adams was the delivery guy.

Eight minutes into the third quarter and with

Missoula a tough, but welcome place for EWU

Despite being a house of horrors with painful losses in his last two visits to Washington Grizzly Stadium, Eastern Washington University head football coach Beau Baldwin is looking forward to returning there this Saturday when his third-ranked Eagles clash with the No. 10 Grizzlies.

"It's going to be a tremendous challenge, but that's what we love," Baldwin said this past Monday during the EWU Coaches Show. "We love

those challenges, we love going on the road; what better place than Missoula?"

And challenging it always seems to be.

In their last visit in 2011 the Eagles fell 17-14 with Montana's John Kanagata's interception with 25 seconds to play preserving the Griz victory in front of a record crowd of 26,066.

In 2009, after falling behind by 14 points in the third quarter, Eastern rallied to knot the score at

EWU men predicted mid-pack in Sky

Coaches tab EWU fifth, media sixth in preseason men's polls

Encouraged by a youthful team with a fast finish a year ago, the Eastern Washington University men's basketball team has been picked to finish fifth by the coaches and sixth by the media in preseason polls announced by the

Big Sky Conference Oct. 17. Eastern returns four starters and seven total letterwinners from last year's team, which finished 10-21 overall and 7-13 in the 11-team Big Sky under head coach Jim Hayford. Now entering his third year at the helm of a squad with no seniors, EWU was picked to finish behind preseason pick Weber State, North Dakota, Montana and Northern Colorado in the coaches' poll. The media picked Montana State to finish in fifth just ahead of the Eagles.

"I think the Big Sky Conference is going to be more difficult - there are many teams returning solid rosters," Hayford said. "We have a very challenging preseason that will prepare us for a great conference season." Eastern opens its season Sunday, Nov. 10 versus Pacific University.

Weber State, which is coming off a school-record 30 win season, earned 31 of the 34 first-place votes from the media and a total of 370 points. Weber was a unanimous selection in the coaches' poll.

youngsters, the Mariners in 2014 don't really have a reason for competing. Their general manager, Jack Zduriencik, has been given a one-year extension (read that as a "lame duck" year), after which he'll likely be gone. After a once-promising start in 2009 that began by cleaning house and setting out to build a strong foundation, questionable-turned-terrible trades and signings have doomed

his tenure. Milton Bradley, Chone Figgins and Jesus Montero are just three names that come to mind.

Ultimately, this offseason is one of the most important in the franchise's history, and the best solution I've found is on the blog USS Mariner. First dump the baggage of terrible players and administration. Then, instead of going the same traditional route as the other 29 teams in the MLB, let's take our good ship off

on an adventure. Let's have a player-manager.

It would be a complete shake-up of the current system, and would help save some money on payroll. Sure, there's the question of how smoothly things would run, but at least it would provide a reason for the Mariners to give an older player, like Raul Ibanez, a contract for next year. While he might not be productive out on the field, he at least has the chops to be a great manager, earning kudos

from former skipper Lou Pinella.

If the Mariners give this a serious look, it could bring a bit of life into the team, assuming the offseason falls flat on its face. At the very worst, having a player-manager would mean the team would be the laughingstock of baseball, in which case nothing really changed from 2013.

34-34 with a Taiwan Jones touchdown with just 4 minutes, 58 seconds left. But the Grizzlies went on an 11-play, 55-yard drive scoring the winning points with 1:18 remaining.

Dan Carpenter's 34-yard field goal with 26 seconds to play lifted the Griz to a 24-23 win in Paul Wulff's final trip to Missoula in 2007. The last EWU win there came in 2005, 34-20.

"It's an amazing atmosphere," Baldwin said of the close-quarters in Mis-

soula where the rabid Griz fans are within arms-reach of the players.

"To their credit, I don't know what it will be, 26,000 fans give or take, but it'll feel louder than some of the places we've been to with 60,000 fans, whatever it might be," Baldwin said.

But Baldwin says the atmosphere also plays into his team's approach and preparation. "Everything from pre-game to walking into the stadium you feel that energy," he said. "You work all year and you only get so many guaranteed Saturdays, and only twice

in four years you get to play in Missoula," Baldwin said. "You put a lot of time into those three hours, and it means something to our players."

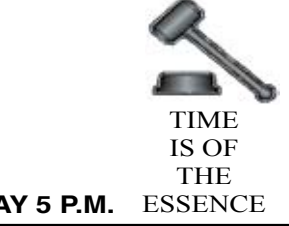

Support for these trips is provided by volunteers and is at no cost to the veterans. Volunteers act as guardians on the trips to Washington D.C. and ensure that the veterans have a safe and enjoyable trip. Top priority is given to our most senior heroes—survivors of WWII and any veteran with a terminal illness who wishes to visit their memorial. The program will naturally transition to the Korean War, Vietnam War and all other veterans who served, on a chronological basis. Trips are simply not possible without public support. Prior to the Honor Flight Network, many veterans had given up all hope of ever seeing the Word War II Memorial. Now they have hope, but time is not on our side. The time to act is now! We truly believe that the service of our WWII vets and their sacrifices saved the world from oppression and tyranny, and this is our very small way of saying, "Thank You."
